We welcome you today

We would like to remind our visitors of the following;:

- All people are encouraged to participate in the sacred services of our Church. We hope that you will be able to worship as well as have fellowship with us. Should you wish any information about the Orthodox Faith or this parish in particular, please see the rector or any member of the church. We are able to place you on our mailing list.
- Only Orthodox Christians may receive the Eucharist (Holy Communion) in the Orthodox Church. In like manner, Orthodox Christians may not receive the sacraments in an non-Orthodox Church. While we hope that one day all Christians will find unity and be able to approach the chalice of our Lord together, we observe the teachings of the Church that the Eucharist is a gift of unity and not a means of unity.

We remind our faithful and visitors of the following guidelines concerning the Holy Sacraments in the Orthodox Church.

- Orthodox Christians are urged to receive Holy Communion frequently.
- ❖ Communicants should be at peace with others before approaching the chalice(Mt 5:23-24)
- Realize the importance of making a thorough examination of sins and transgressions against God, ourselves and others and having prayed for forgiveness before coming to Holy Communion.
- Frequent communicants should come to Holy Confession at least four times a year (during the four fasting periods of the year). and additionally when an examination of conscience reveals the necessity to do so in order to heal any sinful behavior.
- Communicants should fast from all foods and liquids from the evening before receiving Holy Communion.
- Communicants should read prayers in preparation for receiving Holy Communion.
- All Orthodox Christians must receive the sacraments at least once a year.
- Those who are late for Divine Liturgy (after the reading of the Epistle and Gospel) should not approach the chalice.
- Those who are ill or who have special physical needs are exempt from the above guidelines.
- Infants and children (up to the age of seven) who are Orthodox Christians may receive Holy Communion and are exempt from the above guidelines.

Thank you for gathering to worship with us today. Together we have glorified the One God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. May we be brought closer to one another and closer to God by following the eternal teachings of our Lord.

тим, хто часто причащається, слід приходити на святу сповідь принаймні чотири рази на рік (під час кожного із чотирьох щорічних постів);



LESSON FROM THE SECOND EPISTLE OF SAINT PAUL TO THE CORINTHIANS

I felt sure that my joy would be the joy of you all. For I wrote you with much affliction, with anguish of heart, and with many tears, not to cause you pain, but to show you the abundant love I feel for you.

THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO ST. MATTHEW

(c.22, v.2-14)

The Lord narrated this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. So he sent his servants to summon those who had been invited to the banquet. But they refused to come.

Again he sent other servants and said to them: 'Tell those who have been invited: 'Behold, I have prepared my banquet, my bullocks and my fat calves are slaughtered and everything is ready. Come to the wedding festival.' But they ignored him, and went off, one to his estate, another to his business, while the others seized his servants, insulted them and killed them."

"When the king heard this news, he was enraged, sent his troops, put those murderers to death, and burned their city. Then he said to his servants: The banquet is ready, but those who were invited proved unworthy of it. So go out to the thoroughfares and invite to the banquet everyone you find. The servants went out to the streets, and gathered all the people they could find, good or bad, so the hall was filled with guests."

"But when the king went in to look at the guests, he observed a man who was not wearing a wedding-garment and said to him: 'My friend, how did you come in here without a wedding-garment?' He made no reply. Then the king said to his attendants: 'Bind him hand and foot, and throw him to the outer darkness, where sinners are wailing and gnashing their teeth.' For many are called, but few are chosen."

A New Year! Let's Be Peaceful

Today (Sept. 1/14) marks the start of a new Church Year on the Orthodox calendar, and, like all New Year's celebrations, this offers us a moment to reflect and reorient our actions and our attitudes to a more peaceful life. And in the midst of this chaotic age of "us vs. them" and "Red vs. Blue" and "Right vs. Left" and all the other ways we use our fantasy words to belong to tribes and even create new "tribes" out of thin air so we can have somebody to be against, it's time we resign from the external drama and embrace the hard work of creating an inner life of peace and Christ-like joy.

That all sounds good, I know. And we will all nod our heads in agreement. But to actually do this is to put aside the opposite delusion from drama – and that is the notion that if we are to have peace, we have to ignore those ideologies that destroy and keep our mouths shut. To be sure, silence is a wise choice until you know your words will be seasoned with love and truth. But the peace the Faith describes has little to do with the absence of conflict and everything to do with a singular vision and a faithful inner and external life. Anyone who has that kind of life is going to upset a world gripped by their own intoxicated passions and delusional living. As St. Anthony once said "There will be a time when men will be mad, and they will see you, and say "You are mad. You are not like us."

So, this Christian Peace has a different feel to it than the mere absence of conflict and "let's go along to get along." This is something of a different quality altogether.

Look at our lesson today in 1 Timothy 2:1-7:

TIMOTHY, my son, first of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all men, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life, godly and respectful in every way. This is good, and it is acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all, the testimony to which was borne at the proper time. For this I was appointed a preacher and apostle (I am telling the truth, I am not lying), a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and truth.

St. Paul is writing to St. Timothy as Timothy pastors his first parish and he's going to have to navigate the interpersonal relationships in a parish, a city, and a country. It's no easy thing to traverse these pit-filled paths of interpersonal relationships. You have to pay attention! So, St. Paul gives young Timothy three spiritual labors that will create peace in his heart. These same labors (notice I said "labors." You are going to have to work on this) can create an inner peace in you as well.

First, pray and celebrate God's will. Notice the list of people Timothy was called to pray for: All men; Kings and all who are in "high" positions; so that the believers can live a "quiet, peaceable, godly, and respectful life." If I am going to have peace, I can't be self-focused. I have to turn my focus outward to others, to those who have authority over the society where I live. I have to pray for them, intercede for them, and offer thanksgivings for them. And my prayers, my spiritual labor focused outward will create the space for personal peace!

Second, understand God's desire. You see, if I am going to have peace in my life (by the way, "peace" here doesn't mean the absence of conflict as much as the resting trust that God is in control) I am going to have to expand my understanding of God's purpose in the people around me. God desires that "all men" be saved and learn the truth. That's what God wants, and, unless I learn how to want the same thing, then my desires and God's desires are going to be in conflict. God desires all people to know Him and my life is going to be at peace when I settle that truth in my heart. Constantly looking for retribution or "payback" will never create peace in my life.

Finally, embrace God's wisdom. My peace is always enhanced when I take the time to learn my faith. When I learn the extent God has been willing to go to accomplish His will and to achieve His desire, I will see just how much God loves me, and, even my enemies! His wisdom says the price He paid to destroy the enemies of humanity (sin, death, and Satan) is worth it! Which means you are worth the price Jesus paid to set you free! When that reality is constantly before my eyes and in my heart, I can rest knowing that no matter what life throws at me, it can never be greater than God's love for me!

The Church New Year is called "The Indiction" and comes from the old Roman Empire pagan days when the emperors would levy a tax on the population to be paid over 15 years for the support of the army since soldiers served 15-year terms. Constantinople and the Eastern Orthodox have kept this tradition to this day by marking September 1st as the beginning of the New Ecclesial Year. All of this is connected to the rhythm of the harvest seasons of the year. Today, our Ecumenical Patriarch asks us to especially remember the great gift of our world and the environment to faithfully steward this wonderful creation as loving servants of the Creator Who made and then gave this beautiful creation to us to "tend." We mark this day with special prayers that God will give us good fair weather, seasonable rains, and abundant fruits of the earth. We also remember the Lord's entry into the synagogue in Nazareth and proclaiming the "acceptable year of the Lord." The people of Juda marked this same date in their calendar with the blowing of trumpets and offering hymns of thanksgiving to God. All of this points us to the purposeful peaceful life in acknowledging our Creator and choosing to live lives of thank=ful faithfulness to Him

Today, are you a peaceful person? Do you know how to allow God to create a space for peace in your life? There is so much wisdom in this Orthodox Faith just waiting for you to embrace it, unpack it, and apply it to your everyday life. I Am Adam

I have a wonderful ten-year-old boy in our church community named Levi, Levi Matthew. Levi was born with terrible birth defects, a condition—I don't know the name of it—that usually limits the life expectancy of children with this condition to six months. Levi broke the record.

When I first told my spiritual father about Levi, his only response was to be quiet for a moment, shed a tear and eventually say, "I am Adam." What he meant by saying "I am Adam" is that he is personally responsible for the suffering in the world. His sin, his failure to fulfil the divine image, is the cause of Levi's suffering, of all the suffering in the world. This is similar to what Elder Zosimas in Dostoevsky's *Brother Karamazov* says: "However mad it seems, it is true. For if I myself were righteous, perhaps there would be no criminal standing before me now." The big difference between the two is that Elder Zosimas is a fictional character, while my spiritual father is a living person. There are real "Elder Zosimases" in the world. They are just hard to find.

Scott Cairns points out in his excellent and beautifully written book, *The End of Suffering*, that the age-old conundrum of theodicy has a useful purpose nowadays. For those who might not know, theodicy is expressed by the question, if God is good and all powerful, why is there suffering in the world? The useful purpose of theodicy nowadays, or rather the usefulness of reflecting on theodicy, is that it forces us to examine the assumption of individuality. That is, one of the several aspects of the conundrum of theodicy is the assumption that human beings are autonomous individuals, that human beings are unconnected and thus not sharing together in the responsibility for the suffering that each and all bring into the world.

You might ask, but how does that explain something like what happened to Levi? And I would answer, I don't know, completely. But I do know that most children who are not born with serious birth defects suffer because of what the adults in their lives do or don't do. I know that most of the suffering that I encounter is not because of an apparently random and so called "act of god." Most people who suffer, suffer because those they love, do not love them, because those who should protect and help them, ignore or abuse them—not out of hatred, but out of selfish preoccupation with their own pain. Most people suffer because human beings are not autonomous individuals, but because human beings are persons in relationship and are connected most intimately with other human beings. We hurt each other by our sins, by our selfish preoccupation with ourselves, by our inability and unwillingness to pay attention to anyone but ourselves.

And even in the case of Levi or other people with serious handicaps, I would imagine that most of their suffering is not because of the physical pain they experience nor because of some existential questions that are going unanswered in their mind. I think most of the suffering severely handicapped people experience is because they are largely invisible. Because their humanity and personhood is often ignored by you and me, because we are uncomfortable in their presence, because we are too busy with our selfish pursuits to take the time to love someone who might not be able to love us back in a way that would make us feel good about ourselves. Yes, I think even for people who have been born with serious handicaps or have been injured in an apparently random accident, for these too, most of their suffering (but certainly not all) is due the sin and selfishness of others.

Because human beings are persons, and not autonomous individuals, each person's sin affects everyone. There are no victimless crimes, you might say. Or you might also say, "I am Adam." https://blogs.ancientfaith.com/prayingintherain/2023/09/i-am-adam/
